Following completion of the major work he did on *Egret* in late May, thank you letters were written to those who helped Juan Suarez with the repairs of the *Egret*. After consulting with The Barnacle Society Board President, John Palenchar, I provided the letters. At the TBS Board meeting on June 16th, the Board voted to award Juan a free TBS membership for one year.

Board member Amy Exum and her husband, Cedric, along with my wife, Nora, and I did not have a smooth takeoff from the outer piling of our ruined dock. We ended up sideswiping a sunken boat on the southern fringe of the Coconut Grove Sailing Club's mooring field. This left a scratch on *Egret's* starboard side. Otherwise, we had a good day on the water. Juan will attend to the scratch.

On August 6th, I noticed that the chafing gear, or protective coverings, on *Egret's* two mooring lines were not in the bow chocks where they belonged, but instead had slipped below *Egret's* rub rail. Janis Horn, who installed the new mooring lines last year, said that she would fix the problem.

Unfortunately, the heavy seaweed and thick muck at The Barnacle's shoreline, and the fact that we have no dock, has made it very difficult to get to and from *Egret*. With

approval from Park Manager Jessica Cabral and President John Palenchar, I asked Juan Suarez about getting a mooring at CGSC. He obtained approval for a stay of two weeks, and on August 7th Egret was moved to Buoy #3, this buoy

# **Meet our New Park Manager**

Jessica Cabral is a South Florida native who grew up camping, fishing and boating in her state's beautiful parks and waters. She first wanted to be a Park Ranger during an elementary school field trip to Shark Valley, where she spotted her first eastern indigo snake and learned about the highly specialized diet of the Everglades snail kite.

Jessica's long career in parks began just a few years after that memorable field trip while she was still a sophomore in high school. She worked as a counselor in Miami-Dade County Parks' Camp on the Sea and other nature-based summer camps and also led educational tours at Bear Cut Preserve on Key Biscayne throughout high school and her first year of college.

A competitive swimmer and water polo player, she met her spouse at the Miami-Dade College South Campus pool, where she practiced and he was a lifeguard. When he joined the U.S. Navy, she followed him, first to Philadelphia then to San Diego, where their first child was born.

Jessica and her infant daughter returned to Miami weeks after Hurricane Andrew in 1992, and her husband joined her at the end of his enlistment. She then worked a variety of jobs including bank teller, retail sales associate and airline reservations sales representative. She had a second daughter and earned an associate degree before returning to her park roots as a Naturalist at the Deering Estate in 2004. There, she had many excellent mentors who inspired her to learn more about South Florida's natural and cultural history.

In addition to creating interpretive tours, programs and materials for the County, she led recreational programs such as canoe excursions, nature walks and bicycle tours for children and adults. She also served as the Deering Estate's Volunteer Coordinator and as a liaison for instructors leading art and fitness classes in the park. The Estate had no Museum Registrar or Curator when it received a donation of books and artwork, and so she took on responsibility for museum accessions, as well.

Her experience with interpretation and collections earned her an OPS position at The Barnacle Historic State Park in 2011, and she was promoted to Park Services Specialist in 2012. Over the last ten years at The Barnacle, she has served as Interpretive, Volunteer, and Exotic Removal Chairperson and has worked closely with the park's partners, including its Citizen Support Organization, The Barnacle Society. She has also continued her work with museum collections and has gained a wealth of knowledge planning and conducting special events.

Jessica is proud to work for the Florida Park Service, and looks forward to her new role as Park Manger of The Barnacle—a unique and outstanding historic site.



# Mike Chapman, "Artist in Residence"

The Barnacle is the oldest house in South Florida still resting on its original foundation. Surrounding The Barnacle is a rich maritime tradition going back to the "Days of Sail" where there were few, if any, roads in South Florida. One of the volunteers at The Barnacle Historic State Park who is doing much to uphold this maritime tradition is Mike Chapman.

Mike's expertise is boatbuilding, and most of his work is done in The Barnacle's boathouse, which is also historic. It was in the original

Boathouse that Commodore Ralph Munroe lived while his house on the hill was being built. In the current Boathouse, Mike has completed several boatbuilding projects. His current project is the restoration of The Barnacle's Bahamian Sailing Dinghy, *Wyannie Malone*.

Wyannie is named after the wife of a famous Bahamian boat builder, and it has sailed in our Annual Washington's Birthday Regatta with Mike at the helm. Unfortunately, Wyannie suffered greatly during a period of neglect. Her wood hull dried out, her seams opened up, and many of her planks are cracked and broken. Mike's work includes replacing the broken planks, and to do this he has to first remove old and corroded bronze screws. All of this requires much effort and skill.

The Barnacle's new Park Manager. Jessica Cabral, has been helping Mike. The Barnacle Society Board President John Palenchar and Board Member Gabi Bello have also been working with Mike in the Boathouse. Mike is a meticulous worker, and he is very good about keeping numerous friends informed by email and pictures of his progress. These include the





Commodore's oldest grandson, Bill Munroe, who was raised in The Barnacle before it became a State Park, and longtime The Barnacle Society maritime volunteer, Renny Young.

Mike has also consulted and done repairs on *Egret*, The Barnacle's historic design, two-masted sailboat moored in the water by the Boathouse. We are all truly proud and grateful to have Mike Chapman on our team at The Barnacle.
